Look at the lounging lions. • To start planning my own leaflet about the Al Ain zoo using all the features we have already discussed – a hook, alliteration, maps and features.
	Maths	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Recall our subtraction facts to 100 taking away tens (100 – 10, 100- 20, 100 -30 etc...) • Subtract a 1 digit number from a 2 digit number crossing ten. Eg. $24 - 6 = \dots\dots\dots 24 - 4 = 20$ and then $20 - 2 = 18$
	Other Subjects	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To identify and name a variety of plants and animals in their habitats • To describe how animals, obtain their food from plants and other animals, using the idea of a simple food chain, and identify and name different sources of food by making a variety of food chains.

Home learning this week:

English – Read your English book every day. Practise your spelling words and spelling sentences

Maths - Can you continue the pattern... $90 = 100 - 10$ $80 = 100 - 20$

Additional Extra –

Draw a picture of an animals' habitat that you saw at the zoo. Explain why that habitat is perfect for that animal.

Eg. A camel lives in the desert. The desert is perfect for a camel because they have a thick coat of hair that protects them from the sun. They have wide, soft feet, so they can walk for a long time in the hot sand. When there is food and water, a camel can eat and drink large amounts and store it as fat in the hump and then when there is no water they can still survive.
